- I. **CALL TO ORDER**: The Regular meeting of the Board of Education was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Board Vice President, Kris Cole. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited to open the meeting.
- II. ROLL CALL: Present Elroy Buckner, Tim Burgess, Kris Cole, Susan Franklin, Steve Kelly, and JB Meeuwenberg. Absent Dave Hazekamp.

III. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Item 23-151. MOTION by Buckner, SECOND by Franklin to approve the agenda, as amended. The order in which the presentations are ordered on the agenda will be reversed. The student presentation will be made before the annual financial audit presentation.

IV. PRESENTATIONS:

• Be Nice. Presentation - Tracy Taylor, Jackie Mavrakis, and Students

High school students (Jorja Blackmer, Caden Carrillo, Cole DeRuiter, Sadie Haase, and Brooklyn Russell), high school teacher Tracy Taylor, and high school social worker Jackie Mavrakis, presented on the Be Nice program to the Board of Education. They shared the rationale and process for forming the team, they shared activities that they are engaging in to improve the culture and reduce stigma surrounding mental health issues in the high school and throughout our community, and they shared the continual growth of the program to include now more than 30 students and growing. This suicide prevention program and action

plan is a strategy used by the District in its continuum of prevention, intervention, and postvention strategies.

• Annual Audit Presentation - Paul Matz (Rehmann Robson, LLC.)

Paul Matz, CPA, CGFM (Principal and Director) with Rehmann Robson, LLC presented the annual audit report to the District. Rehmann Robson, LLC presented the independent auditor's communication and report, the financial statements and supplementary information, the single audit act compliance report, the audit reports on the 2017 building and site bonds, and the 2018 building and site bonds, series II. Once again, the District received the highest audit opinion, a clean, unmodified opinion with zero findings. The District continues to qualify as a low risk auditee.

• Update on Athletic Conference Discussion

The Board discussed a request for seven (7) schools to withdraw from the OK Conference, and discussed an update pertaining to next steps with the Board.

The Board discussed an updated grade 3-8 M-STEP data portrait and comparison from the spring 2023 M-STEP assessment.

VII. REMARKS FROM THE PUBLIC:

Susan Halter thanked the Board of Education for allowing the Dancing into Sunset group to use the high school cafeteria on Thursday evenings during the summer months in the event of inclement weather. Susan shared a number of written thank you notes and messages with the Board of Education, and was appreciative of the support for this community program.

1. Report of committee meeting held on October 9, 2023

Steve Kelly reported on a Personnel Committee meeting held on October 9, 2023 at 5:00 p.m. Dave Hazekamp, Steve Kelly, JB Meeuwneberg, and Jason Kennedy were present. The Committee discussed the Personnel Report for October 2023. The Committee also reviewed disciplinary action that was taken against a staff member, and the process that was followed to provide due process to the staff member prior to implementation of the disciplinary action. The Committee also discussed implementation of a stepped wage scale for Early Childhood Center staff as a way to retain current staff, while assisting in the recruitment of future staff to the program. The meeting was adjourned at 5:28 p.m.

2. Early Childhood Center Staff Wage Recommendation

Dear Ms. Bellville-Cormier:

Based on a thorough investigation, the District's administration has concluded that Angel Bellville engaged in conduct that is in violation of Board of Education policy 5206(H)(4)(b), which states: "If a student in grade 6 or above commits a physical assault at school against another student, and the physical assault is reported to the Board or to an administrator, the District will consider whether to suspend or expel the student or to impose a less severe penalty after first considering the Mandatory 7 Factors." As a result, administration has referred this matter to the District's Board and has recommended that Angel Bellville be expelled from school for 180 school days/permanently.

Following a hearing, which will be held on November 20, 2023 at 6:30 p.m. in the Board of Education Meeting Room at 3255 E. Pontaluna Rd. Fruitport, MI 49415, the Board will make the final decision whether to expel Angel. At the hearing, you and/or Angel, may submit evidence and present testimony to challenge the administration's findings or disciplinary recommendation.

You have the right pursuant to both Policy 2501 and Open Meetings Act Section 8(1)(b) to have the Board hold the hearing in private (i.e., in a closed session of the Board), but as also required by law and Policy, the Board must act on the matter publicly (i.e., in open session). If you want the Board to hold the hearing in private, the District will not disclose any personally identifiable information in open session when it acts. Please notify me as soon as possible whether you would like the Board to proceed in open or closed session. A copy of the hearing procedures and a letter to request a closed session are attached.

Until the Board issues its final decision, Angel Bellville will be suspended from school, may not attend classes or other school functions, may not be present on school property, and may not participate in extracurricular activities. If you have any questions, please contact me.

I am recommending Angel Bellville (10th grade) for an expulsion hearing. Angel assaulted another student during lunch on Tuesday November 7, 2023. The incident involving Angel Bellville was a serious matter, resulting in physical harm and the need for emergency medical treatment for the victim.

Without provocation, Angel punched another student a minimum of three times directly in his face during lunch in the lunchroom. The resulting force caused two of the students' teeth to fall out and the student had to undergo emergency treatment in hopes to restore his teeth. This was also quite traumatic to the students around this area where this happened as there was a great deal of blood.

The victim did not strike back but did put up his hands in a way to defend/deflect Angel from punches as he tried to back away from Angel. This incident was recorded on the security cameras and preserved by Mr. Rogers.

Angel was suspended for 10 days for a "physical assault against another student". I have reviewed the seven factors we must consider before expelling a student and thus recommending him to the board for expulsion based on the seriousness of the offense, the impact on the victim, and the need for a response that ensures the safety and well-being of all students.

5200 Student Conduct and Discipline

5206-F-19 Due Process - Hearing Rights and Procedures

Right to a Hearing

Before a student is suspended from school for more than 10 school days or is expelled from school, the student has a right to a hearing. The Superintendent conducts hearings for students who have committed an offense that may result in suspension of less than 60 school days. A removal from school for 60 or more school days is an expulsion. The Board conducts hearings for students who have committed an offense that may result in expulsion.

What is a Hearing?

If, after investigating student misconduct, a school administrator determines that a student engaged in misconduct that should result in either a suspension of more than 10 school days or an expulsion, the administrator will refer the matter to either the Superintendent or the Board. Either the Superintendent or the Board will conduct a due process hearing to determine: (1) whether the alleged misconduct occurred, and (2) if so, the appropriate consequence.

The student and his or her parent/guardian will be notified in writing at least 3 calendar days before the hearing. The notice will include: (1) a description of the alleged misconduct; (2) the potential disciplinary consequences that may be imposed; (3) the date, time, and location of the hearing; and (4) an invitation to the student and his or her parent/guardian to attend and participate in the hearing.

During the hearing, school administrators will describe the alleged misconduct and explain the facts related to the misconduct. The student and his or her parent/guardian may present evidence and witnesses to demonstrate that the student did not engage in the alleged misconduct or that suspension or expulsion is not the appropriate consequence. The student and his or her parent/guardian may also present evidence of any mitigating factors that the Superintendent or the Board should consider. The student and his or her parent/guardian may be represented by an attorney or another adult advocate at their cost.

Although the student and his or her parents/guardians are entitled to due process, a student discipline hearing is not a "trial." The student and his or her parent/guardian do not have the right to compel attendance of witnesses or to "cross examine" witnesses. Typical rules of evidence are not followed. A student's refusal to answer a question or failure to attend a hearing may be considered by the Superintendent or the Board.

Superintendent Hearing

If, following an investigation, a student is recommended for suspension for more than 10 school days but fewer than 60 school days, the Superintendent will conduct the

hearing. At least 3 calendar days before the hearing, the Superintendent will provide the student and his or her parent/guardian the written notice described above.

The Superintendent will not suspend the student unless, after the completion of the hearing, the Superintendent is convinced, based on a preponderance of the evidence, that the student committed a violation of the Student Code of Conduct and that, after considering all legally required factors, suspension is the appropriate consequence. The Superintendent will provide written notice of the decision to the student and parent/guardian.

Board Hearing

If, following an investigation, a student is recommended for expulsion, the Board will conduct the hearing. Only the Board may expel a student.

At least 3 calendar days before the Board hearing, the Superintendent or designee will provide the student and his or her parent/guardian the written notice described above.

The hearing will take place at a regular or special Board meeting. The student and his or her parent/guardian may request that deliberations be held in closed session pursuant to Michigan Open Meetings Act section 8(b). The student and his or her parent/guardian must notify the Superintendent before the hearing to request that the deliberations occur in closed session.

The Board will not expel the student unless, after the completion of the hearing, a majority of the Board members are convinced, based on a preponderance of the evidence, that the student committed a violation of the Student Code of Conduct or an offense requiring suspension or expulsion under the Revised School Code and that, after considering all legally required factors, suspension or expulsion is the appropriate consequence. The Superintendent or designee will provide written notification of the Board's decision to the student and his or her parent/guardian. The Board's decision is final.

Students with Disabilities

Suspension or expulsion of a student with a disability is subject to the rights and procedures guaranteed by state and federal law. Except as otherwise authorized by law, a student with a disability may not be suspended for more than 10 consecutive school days or expelled for conduct that is a manifestation of the student's disability.
